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## Immigration as a Moral Issue

Having survived the hectic holiday season, many of us are now playing catch-up with our daily lives. In the face of so many demands, why is the immigration issue deserving of our attention, time, and energy?

All religious teachings have a common message: We are one. We are connected. We are all in this together. The first UU principle is the commitment to affirm and promote the inherent worth and dignity of every being.

Undocumented immigration is an immense problem driven by economic need and U.S. businesses' voracious need for cheap labor. This has created an under-class of residents who are refused the dignity and civil protections that come with citizenship. Immigration is a complex and multifaceted issue with no easy answers. Most Americans can agree that this is a problem that needs to be addressed. Breaking up poor working families does not feel like justice, equity, and compassion in action. Refusing minimal health services to children is not how we should treat members of our human family. Police forces that profile brown people does not feel like breaking down the walls that divide us. Building an impenetrable fence across hundreds of miles of border does

## **Board of Trustee's Report**

*"We are an inclusive community of seekers pursuing deeper meaning through the process of spiritual engagement, learning, reasoning, and action." ~the Mission of NUUC*

The Board meeting was held on December 10. The meeting opened with lighting the chalice and reciting the mission of the church. The minutes from the previous meeting were accepted; then we turned our attention to the 2012 budget.

The Board discussed how to cover the approximate \$5K deficit, including fundraising opportunities within and outside the church, increasing building rental opportunities, chalice lighter grants, and sponsorship of music. Because the expenses to maintain and run the church are our responsibility the Board decided to bring the budget to the congregation as is and ask the congregation to solve the deficit. The Board acknowledged that if the congregation was unable to raise the needed \$5K the difference could be covered by the capital.

Due to initial feedback from the congregation, including questions of financial feasibility in the current economy, the Board decided to postpone the congregational vote on the building expansion capital campaign for one month. The Board decided to gather further information from the congregation regarding the mission, needs, growth of the congregation, and finances. The board will host large-group and small-group conversations and offer an online survey (see the special invitation in this newsletter) to develop a clear vision of the needs and desires of the congregation.
