This has been one of the biggest requests from the area. So, we are partnering again with the group that took blankets and books to the Jersey shore hurricane victims last fall. This time we are answering a request for "Kitchen Recovery Kits". Each kit will help a family that is making a fresh start after so many months of waiting.

We will have tags on the bulletin board for NEW items that you can donate. Please take a tag, bring in that item and put it in the bins. . Then we will pack up the boxes so the folks traveling to Manasquan, New Jersey can deliver them directly to the churches that will distribute them. The items need to be at NUUC by Sunday, April 28th.

- Pots, pans
- Mixing/serving bowls
- Mixing spoons, measuring cups/spoons
- Toaster or toaster oven
- Service for four

Council. There are several legislative issues that will be considered by the Ohio General Assembly. Powerful lobbyists for the utility companies are working hard to weaken Ohio's exemplary Clean Energy Act which requires utility companies to meet set standards for increasing the energy efficiency of their customers and for increasing alternative renewable energy resources. Another legislative initiative involves lobbying for a moratorium on fracking until safety concerns are addressed. Environmental groups are also seeking an increase in the severance tax on oil and gas production to help pay for additional inspectors to enforce safety regulations as well as to offset infrastructure and public health costs to local communities resulting from fracking.
